reetings Everyone!

Spring is just a few weeks away, although we probably won't feel the effects of spring for several more weeks. That's OK, I am excited just the same. This month I thought I would share with you some of my most important sights, smells, and sounds of spring.

I can't wait for that very first unseasonably warm spring day, that first day when I am tempted to wear just a short sleeve shirt. I know that I shouldn't because I could catch a cold, but I do anyway because I am still taking 2000 mg of Vitamin C every day and I haven't caught a cold all winter. I can't wait for the first blades of grass to start turning green from their wintery dull brown. I especially look forward to the very first stems of the Daffodils coming up through the ground. I look and look for them and finally when I come home from work one day, I'll notice the first tiny stems poking up from the ground. When I see the daffodils, I smile because for me, spring finally is here, it's not just coming shortly, it has arrived.

Now it is finally time to start working on the boat. I do small projects at first, and then I do more as the weather gets progressively warmer. After May 1, it's time to start to work on the hull. This is very enjoyable to me because it means I am close now to finishing the hardest part of spring maintenance. That beautiful green bottom paint has a wonderful smell to it when I am painting. The warmer the spring day is, the better it smells because it means I am close to getting her in the water. My absolute favorite part about working on the hull is pulling the masking tape off the waterline. The bottom looks so sharp in her green paint next to her dark blue waterline. The hull absolutely gleams in her Poly-Glow finish. This is a very satisfying sight of spring.

Next on the list is the engine maintenance and the very last maintenance item I do to the engines is to change the lower gear oil. This has a smell unlike anything else. It is a very specific smell unique only to gear oil. It smells like no other kind of lubricant. I love this smell because it means I am so close to start



# 25 YEARS AGO

# **March 1985**

There is an interesting article in the March 1985 Yardarm by our own Debbie Baker. The article describes what had been the practice for the previous three years of having a liars contest at the Founders Day Dinner. I love the sight and smell of the first huge plumes of white smoke belching from the exhaust from all the fogging oil I put in last fall. The last and most favorite thing that I smell that lets me know spring is here is diesel exhaust and black coffee. # **LEGISLATIVE UPDATE**

The Connecticut legislature is in full swing.
These are some of the bills that are currently working themselves out of committees. For more information on these bills go to <a href="https://www.cga.ct.gov">www.cga.ct.gov</a>

- SB No. 26, An Act Concerning the Expenditures of the Boating Account eliminates the boating account and money to towns in lieu of taxes
- SB No. 124, An Act Concerning Long Island Sound and Coastal Permitting would require Boating Division to record any such permit on land records
- SB No. 193, An Act Concerning Liability Insurance for Boats would require all registered vessels to have liability insurance as a prerequisite to registering the vessel
- <u>HB No. 5421</u>, An Act Concerning Candlewood Lake – *implements the Commissioner's* recommendation to set the maximum boat length to 26'
- <u>SB No. 272</u>, An Act Concerning Drunk Boating – *eliminates the 2hr window for administering BAC tests*
- SB No. 273, An Act Concerning the Discharge of Certain Vessel Pressure Washing Wastewaters allows marinas to engage in pressure washing of vessel bottoms if the wastewater does not contain biocide compounds
- <u>HB No. 5456</u>, An Act Eliminating Reimbursement to members of the Connecticut Pilot Commission and the Connecticut Maritime Commission, and Providing Staff Support to the Connecticut Pilot Commission removes expenditures paid by DOT





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Rules to Live By

In this issue we will discuss Rule 25 Lights and Shapes for Sailing Vessels Underway and vessels under oars. International and Inland Rule 25 are virtually the same.

# **Rule 25 Definitions**

- (a) A sailing Vessels underway shall exhibit:
  - (i) sidelights
  - (ii) sternlight.
- (b) In a sailing vessel of less than 20 meters in length the lights prescribed in paragraph (a) of this Rule may be combined in one lantern carried at or near the top of the mast where it can best be seen.
- (c) (A sailing vessel underway may, in addition to the lights prescribed in paragraph (a) of this Rule, exhibit at or near the top of the mast, where they can best be seen, two all-around lights in a vertical line, the upper being red and the lower being green, but these lights shall not be exhibited in conjunction with the combined lantern permitted by paragraph (b) of this Rule.
- (d) (i) A sailing vessel of less than 7 meters in length shall, if practicable, exhibit the lights prescribed in paragraph a) or (b) of this Rule, but if she does not, she shall have ready at hand and electric torch or lighted lantern showing a white light which shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision.
  - (ii)A vessel under oars may exhibit the lights prescribed in this Rule for sailing vessels, but if she does not, she shall have ready at hand an electric torch or lighted lantern showing a white light which shall be exhibited in sufficient time to

prevent collision.

(e) A vessel proceeding under sail when also being propelled by machinery shall exhibit forward where it can best be seen a conical shape, apex down.


