Member of a more worthy organization.




Reminder:

<u>Looking Back</u>

OVFR THE YARDARM



25 YEARS AGO

April /May 1985

In the April 1985 issue of the Yardarm was an interesting article on Boating Safety by Carl Josephson, AP the Squadron Safety Officer.

Boating Safety

Have you looked at your marine distress signals lately? Are they in <u>good</u> shape? If you are like me, you may be in <u>bad</u> shape. Upon reading an article having to do with flares in the December i1984 issue of Soundings, I took a look at the contents of my trusty Olin Alert/ Locate Kit. Much to my chagrin, I learned that the "Hand Held Red Flares" were stamped with an expiration date of June 1984 and the "12 Gauge Red Meteors" carry a date of June 1985. Certainly we should have the proper signals aboard and you can be sure the Safety Officer of your Squadron will replace his at once.

If your concerned about disposal of you Pyrotechnics, The Olin Corporation advises keeping the signals for an additional three years after the original expiration date. They can be used as extra signals along with current dated signals. Olin also tells us that depending on storage conditions the probability is good that they will still function after the original expiration date.

When you need to use them is <u>no</u> time to wonder which are current and which have expired, and I recommend storing them separately.

If you do not want to keep the expired signals, please remember that these are classified as Type C explosive, so don't just put them out for trash collection.

Check with your local Police Department, Fire Marshall, Coast Guard Station or Marine Supplier.

You may elect to follow the instructions published by Olin Corp. that comes with the Olin Alert/Locate Kits available at most Marine Supply Stores.

Displays of fresh signals at your favoriteMarine supplier, and I'm sure you will hear more about this subject as we get closer to the boating season.

Check now while you are preparing to order your gear and let's be BE SAFE ALL WAYS.

What is the Alliance for Safe Navigation?

The Alliance for Safe navigation consists of industry leaders that all share a commitment to boating safety. The goal of the alliance is to raise the boating community's understanding of and appreciation for up -to -date navigational information. The alliance encourages mariners to recognize the high number of changes made to their charts and to keep their electronic and paper charts accurate, which is inexpensive and easy. The alliance is made up of BoatU.S., Jeppesen Marine, Ocean Graphix, the Sea Tow Foundation for Boating Safety and Education, and the United States Power Squadron.

What Is Our Purpose?

Our intent is to educate the boating community by advocating the following key messages:

- ◆ Mariners with up-to-date navigational charts- paper or electronic are safer than those without
- Most mariners are unaware of the high number of changes made to charts
- Mariners may not be aware that their electronic and paper charts may become outrdated when cartographic changes occur
- Keeping electronic and paper charts updated is inexpensive and easy

Who are Our Members?

- Ocean Graphix a producer of print on demand nautical charts
- Jeppesen Marine a manufacturer of electronic charts and navigational data solutions

Rules to Live By

In this issue we are still looking at the Rules of the Nautical Road in Subpart C, Lights and Shapes. Our discussion continues with Rule 26, Fishing Vessels. With all the commercial fishing boat traffic here at the Eastern end of Long Island Sound we have good reason to pay close attention to the requirements of this Rule.

Rule 26 Definitions

Note: Most parts of International Rule 26 are the same as Inland Rule 26, In those instances where the Inland Rule varies from the International Rule the Additional requirements of the Inland Rule will be included in **bold Italics**.

- (a) A Vessel engaged in fishing, whether underway or at anchor shall exhibit only the lights and shapes prescribed in this Rule.
- (b) A vessel engaged in Trawling, by which is meant the dragging through the water of a dredge net or other apparatus used as used as a fishing appliance, shall exhibit:
- (i) two all around lights in vertical line, the upper green and the lower white, or a shape consisting of two cones with their apexes together in a vertical line one above the other; a vessel of less than 20 meters in length may instead of this shape exhibit a basket
- (ii) a masthead light abaft of and higher than the all around green light; a vessel of less than 50 meters in length shall not be obliged to exhibit such alight but may do so. And
- (iii) when making way thru the water, in addition to the lights prescribed in this paragraph, sidelights and a sternlight.
- (c) A vessel engaged in fishing, other than trawling, shall exhibit:
 - (i) two all around lights in a vertical line, the

upper being red and the lower white, or a shape consisting of two cones with apex together in a vertical line one above the other; a vessel of less than 20 meters in length may instead of this shape exhibit a basket;

- (ii) when there is outlying gear extending more than 150 meters horizontally from the vessel, an all around white light or cone apex upward in the direction of the gear, and
- (iii) when making way through the water, in addition to the lights prescribed in this paragraph, sidelights and a sternlight.
- (d) A vessel engaged in fishing in close proximity to other vessels engaged in fishing may exhibit the additional signals described in Annex II to these Rules.
- (e) A vessel when not engaged in fishing shall not exhibit the lights or shapes prescribed in this Rule, but only those prescribed for a vessel of her length.

work at Columbia University where he received his degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1911. During the great massacare and deportation of Armenians by Turks in 1915. He and Mrs Daghlian and their young son reached Aleppo in Syria where they remained for several years. Dr Daghlian was Director during that time of the Aleppo Armenian Relief School sponsored by the British Expeditionary Forces. In 1920 he came to America and in January 1921 was appointed to Connecticut College faculty, serving until his retirement in 1947. Known as the College's most distinguished teacher, I'm sure your looking forward to hearing him.
