The Committee will be the sole judge of the rules, protests and ratings. Acceptance of an entry does not assume judgment of vessel or skipper's qualifications to participate in the race.

It is the responsibility of the vessels owner and or skipper to see that his or her vessel is seaworthy in hull, rig and gear. Neither USPS District 1 nor the Race Committee will have any responsibility for accidents, injury, or damage to any person or vessel arising out of or in the course of this race regardless of the cause or reason for such incidents.



### 25 YEARS AGO

### June/July 1983

#### NOTICE TO YACHTSMAN

Annex V of the inland Navigation Rules states that after 1 January 1983 the operator of each self –propelled vessel 38 feet or longer shall carry on board and maintain for ready reference a copy of the Inland Navigation Rules.

If you have a forty footer, you may be checked if you are stopped for some other reason. The rules are available from the Government Printing Office, and some of the boating supply house also have reprints which satisfy the requirement.

**Note:** This summer be on the lookout for a blue and white dovetail flag. The Inland Rules Act 1980 recognizes only the blue and white dovetail international flag "A" as the official signal meaning "I have a diver down, keep clear of me" Commercial divers will be required to have said flag mounted 40 inches above the hull.



sent Rule 10 Traffic Separation Schemes/ Vessel Traffic Services. Rule 10 adds an extra dose of traffic management for a number of specially designated areas having high - traffic density, converging traffic, or some exceptional hazard. In these situations, more conventional navigation rules do not provide a desirable margin of safety. Although conceptually similar, The International Rule 10 and Inland Rule 10 differ completely in methods of application. International's "Traffic Separation The Schemes" are coastal routing systems that guide oceangoing merchant ships in approaching or departing busy ports and turning points in crowded sea lanes. The Inland "Vessel Traffic Service" are management systems tailored for a particular ports under U.S. jurisdiction. These systems are "active" (as opposed to to "passive") traffic separation schemes and depend on full-time, shore-based staff and an array of electronic equipment.

### International/Inland

**Traffic Separation Schemes** 

(a) This Rule applies to traffic separation schemes adopted by the Organization and does

not relieve any vessel of her obligation under any other rule. The "Organization" is the

International Maritime Organization (IMO) which is a body of the United Nations."

- (b) A vessel using a traffic separation scheme shall:
- (i) proceed in the appropriate traffic lane in the general direction of traffic flow for that

Lane.

(ii) so far as practicable keep clear of a traffic separation line or separation zone.

- (iii) normally join or leave a traffic lane at the termination of the lane, but when joining or leaving from either side shall do so at as small an angle to the general direction of traffic flow as practicable.
- (c) a vessel shall, so far as practicable, avoid crossing Traffic lanes but if obliged to do so shall cross on a heading as nearly as practicable at right angles to the general direction of traffic flow.

The above is only part of Rule 10, there are eight more sub paragraphs that deserve a thorough reading.

In the United States there are eight Vessel Traffic Services (VTS) which the Coast Guard defines as "integrated systems encompassing the variety of technologies, equipment and people employed to coordinate movements in or approaching a port or waterway" Some of the VTS systems are:

Puget Sound VTS (Seattle, Washington)

Prince William Sound VTS (Valdez, Alaska)

St Mary's River VTS (Sault St Marie, Michigan)

New Orleans VTS (New Orleans, Louisiana)

While most Yachtsman will never have to use either of these Vessel Traffic Systems a thorough understanding of this rule will help you have a better understanding of what the actions of a large merchant ship will likely be in a meeting, crossing situations.
